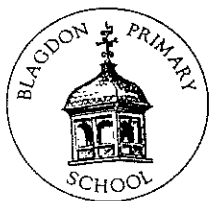

Pupil Premium children at Blagdon Primary School have a range of needs. Barriers to learning for our children include Social and Emotional needs as well as learning needs. Social and emotional needs are met by all staff with special focus from our Learning Mentor. We also need to ensure equal and fair access to the wider curriculum of the school and this is made possible through pupil premium funding. We are flexible in our pupil premium spend in order to match the needs of our pupils.



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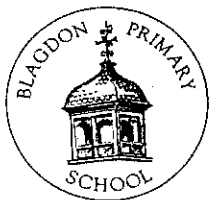

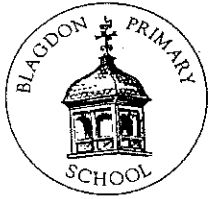
